



DESIGNING A CREMATORY

IN THE LIMESTONE QUARRY OF MALMÖ

The aim is to, through designing in complex contextual contexts characterized by different time footprints, provide knowledge of architecture spatial characteristics and develop their ability to design architecture in specific physical and socially complex situations. Special focus is devoted to contemporary and future issues that may develop architecture in new directions. This course provides basic information about the contemporary construction and future challenges and how these are discussed and evaluated in practice and theory. Adequate methods are introduced and in an applied design task the students are trained in how buildings/environments can add, update and revise existing built structures both in the short and the longer term.

The design task - the dominant element - is situated in an urban or landscape context. The project work should invite to a critical examination of the architectural foundations and to encourage an experimental approach, where innovative and pioneering solutions are tested.

Students are supervised on a weekly basis and at interim briefings and trained to communicate architecture in a structured and insightful way, in words and pictures. The design task is supported by lectures, workshops, literature and seminars. Final examinations are held at a public briefing where invited external critics are involved.

The steep beach ridge of Helsingborg represents a grand landscape element and extends itself in a north-south direction, around 300 meters from shore.

Architecture in Context examines this great landscape element in the city, and its potential role to be a "city developing" factor. The goal of the course was to, with the help of architectural engagement, strengthen the public space in a situation where the topography serves as both an asset and a challenge. This topography acts as a divider and as unifier, extended and underlining and sometimes totally forgotten.

The project was based upon every-day phenomena and was expected to result in a tangible building project within the range of 500-2000 m². The program was individually formulated by each student with the help of assistant teachers.

The course had, as a point of departure, a growing issue in the field of architecture; how can abandoned/forgotten physical situations be re-introduced into the urban fabric? Examples on this exists throughout the world; the High Line in New York or the shipyard area in Malmö. What unifies these examples with the ridge in Helsingborg is that something, ones considered as a limitation, can be seen as a place of possibilities - and it is in this issue we wish future architects to gain insight.

The course gave insight into a method of working where a great complexity should be handled with an understanding of an underlying history/process; - What has generated "the project" and what is the position towards the "raison d' etre" of the project!?

Q is one of the four ateliers at Lund School of Architecture. The 1st and 2nd year students study and work together focusing on the process and methodology as a basis for creative work to achieve both aesthetic and functional architecture. The theme that atelier Q worked with through the year, otherwise general for all the four ateliers, has been - The City. The projects in atelier Q focused on the reading and understanding of transitions from the bigger scale to the smaller, the correlation between different species of spaces and the impact that a small scale structure/insert has on its immediate surroundings, neighborhood and the city. In its explorations Q has used different work methodologies and approached architecture on different levels, such as the mental landscape of meanings, the invisible landscape as geographers Peter Gould and Rodney White refer to (Mental Maps 1974). The invisible landscape, the way we perceive the surrounding environment, the landscapes that shape the interactions and behaviors within the cityscape. As in previous years, the projects were structured in such way that the students got the opportunity to experience and experiment with the combination of theory and practice, collaborating with professionals and individuals outside the school environment.

After one year of intense studies of the urban space, including Paris - the town of flaneurs, the Atelier Z-students are now developing their visions in their final project Urban Space 5 – Playing humans. The point of departure is "Arkitekturstaden Malmö" (Malmö, Town of Architecture) – a brand new tool for dialogue that with 9 theses aims to use architectural knowledge as a fundament now that Malmö strives to reach even further as a model in the field of urban design. Here the students interpret the theses visually.

The principal design task has been to design a nursery school in which architecture plays the key role in creating the best conditions for playing humans at all ages. Crossing boundaries – physical as well as social – has been one of the key objectives. The sites are centrally located in Malmö: one is between the Catholic church and Borgarskolan, the other in a challenging urban context at Södervärn.

Combining the nursery with another public activity, of their choice, is yet another objective. This will not only give the students a good opportunity to shape the urban space explicitly, but also create chance encounters and new conditions for urban life!

The Atelier Z-students interpretations will be part of Malmö stad's ongoing work with Arkitekturstaden Malmö.

Instead, we seek to extend the reach and capability of the designer, using computational tools to investigate new processes, integrated function, and an aesthetic of discontinuity and multiple identities.

Modernistic Architecture changed the traditional design process of architecture in the 21st century. For the first time ever: role models for style were not to be found in the architectural history, but in the growing industry and mass production.

In the spring's studio of Modernistic Architecture we investigated how to revitalize heritage from the recent past in Nyhamnen, in Malmö's harbor. With input from the stakeholders involved, programme- and analyze studies, the studio focused on sketching and discussions in creating design concepts for sustainable transformation projects so as to save the modernistic architecture of Malmö.

The study trip took us to the origin of the modernistic movement in Germany with visits to the Bauhaus school, the Fagus factory, the AEG Werk and the Einstein Turm in Potsdam among others.

The aim with the "ABVN06 Modernistic Architecture – renewal, theory", was to scrutinize means and methods of how to transform and revitalize the modernistic architecture in a sustainable way. With the input from lectures, literature and discussions in theory we analyzed what signifies the architecture of the early 20th century and analyze what it means for us today. We have today's values assessments, the deteriorating existing constructions at risk and the present contexts to consider. What can or shall be saved and why?

Urban shelter development in an international perspective focusing on the conditions of the urban poor is a challenge for many. How should architects work with urban shelter design now and in the future? The task of the students in this course is to design a high density resilient housing area in Metro Manila, the Philippines, after having studied the local context for three weeks.

Important issues include population density, urban segregation, affordability, resilience, public space, safety and security, gender and physical planning, climate smart design, slum-upgrading, finance for low-income housing, organized self-help housing and the role of the architect.

The course is divided into three phases: 1. Preliminary studies in Lund, 2. Field study, three weeks in Metro Manila, 3. Applications and design in Lund.

Field study was carried out in close cooperation with the University of the Philippines – Faculty of Architecture, the National Housing Authority, DMCI Homes, Quezon City and TAO-Pilipinas

The design exercise includes design of a residential neighborhood as group work on two alternative sites and individual design of a building. Short films have also been made as group work reflecting on environment, culture and architecture.

One of the globe's most important challenges today is how to develop, transform and refine our existing cities to be more sustainable. How to make them greener, denser and more fair at the same time. As urban designers we have to respond to this and by thinking in a holistic way, put up goals, strategies and create carefully designed, humane and inclusive urban environments in new ways.

The semester in Sustainable Urban Landscape deals with urban design in a wider perspective – the whole urban landscape. The design project starts out from the understanding that cities are not isolated from their surroundings and must be discussed on a regional scale to create specific conditions for bottom up growth.

The course focuses on design with regard to cultural and natural landscapes, within the general aim of balancing the competing relations between natural and human designed systems. The studio takes on the urban-rural fringe as a rich interface aligning community living, infrastructures and landscape and challenges the students to engage in experimental reflection through design to open fresh perspectives for sustainable living situations where the city meets the landscape.
